

The Art of Building:

Raleigh sculptor enjoys success by combining art, architecture and industrial design.

Toward the end of his time at NC State's College of Design, MATT McConnell'94 concluded that he liked building things more than designing them. So he asked Dana Raymond, his sculpture professor, what he should do. "You'll figure it out," Raymond told him. McConnell had hoped for a more concrete



answer, but it turned out to be all he needed because that's exactly what he's done, finding a niche combining art, architecture and industrial design.

Over the past decade, McConnell Studios has done public and private art projects ranging from 150-foot fabric sail sculptures to table lamps. You name it, and McConnell has probably built it-furniture, globes, movie marquees, a weather vane for a carousel. Even a large DNA sculpture for a biotech company "That was fun, wrestling

stainless-steel pipes into form," he says. "I'm a sculptor and we create, design, fabricate and install architecture, lighting and furniture out of steel, glass, wood, plastic, concrete, whatever. At the core is a creative vision integrated into everyday life. Something as simple as a railing can be artwork."


Following graduation, McConnell worked a few years at the Raleigh-based Clearscapes architecture firm, where he found a sympathetic setting for his idiosyncratic vision merging form and function. After he went out on his own, one of McConnell's first projects was a sculpture for the N.C. Museum of Art's café in Raleigh. Since then, demand for his work has grown. McConnell has done about 500 projects all over the country since 2001. "We get a lot of calls from people who have an idea but don't know how to execute it," he says. "That's what we do, figure out the right solution and materials."

This past spring brought the unveiling of one of McConnell's most ambitious projects, a custom-made percussion instrument he designed and built for the *Tomb Raider* computer game. It's a one-of-a-kind piece made to be a visual match for the game's raw look, and composer Jason Graves used it for percussion effects in his orchestrated score. "I'd never dealt with video games before, and it was great to watch and learn the professional discourse required to execute these projects," McConnell says. "It's not just about the art, it's career path and business and the energy of very creative, driven people."
